This is possibly the earliest portrait of Camille Pissarro after the painter's arrival in France in 1855. Another of the same date was also sold on 8 December 1928 (Paris, Hotel Drouot, 8 December 1928, lot 278, 22 x 12 cm., for i80 frs.). A portrait of Cardoze by Camille Pissarro dating from this same period is in the Ashmolean Museum, Oxford (Brettell and Lloyd 40), on the verso of which there is a self-portrait by Pissarro (Fig. 1 & 2). The clear pencil outlines, the almost fussy accents used for the creases in the trousers, and the neat hatching in the present sheet are close to Pissarro's own style of drawing during the late 1850s and early 1860s. The treatment of the sitter's hair at the back anticipates a drawing of Pissarro by Cezanne (A. Chappuis, The drawings of Paul Cezanne. A catalogue raisonne, London, 1973, i. No. 301 p. 112 repr.).

Jules Cardoze, novelist and artist, was apparently distantly related to Camille Pissarro (Kunstler, 1930, p. 224) and, indeed, maintained close contact with the family up until the 1890s. In 1861 Cardoze was living at 17, rue Notre Dame de Lorette in Paris.
